



STAFF NEWS

Teachers' Professional Learning through an Unconference

On March 18, teachers returned from spring break to continue their professional learning about engagement, effective instructional strategies, and assessment practices. Instead of engaging in typical conference-style sessions, teachers got to choose what they learned, how they learned, and with whom they wanted to share their learning. Teachers took the leap in trying something unconventional and shared some feedback about the experience:

- "We're going to work on an interdisciplinary mini-unit for the last week of school."
- "We learned about the unfinished learning folder that accompanies IM math."
- "Possibly working with the elementary on something my explore kids could do with them!!"
- "Great Discussions on engagement in PE. We are looking at various ways to offer PE to meet the needs of more students."
- "Closing the Gap," ways to take assessment data and incorporate it into instruction immediately."
- "I learned a great deal about different ways technology can be used in the classroom. Many sites I had never heard of, and that could be easy for me to include."
- "I look forward to the possibility of doing a January or May term in the future."
- "A group of secondary teachers discussed incorporating multiple strategies to use cross-instructional information and this is something I would like to participate in. We also discussed finding a way to incorporate clubs into the school day and that would be great to do for students."

In the afternoon, the elementary teachers learned how to incorporate science activities and discussions within existing timeframes and structures. We welcomed Ashley Delaney, Heartland AEA science consultant, to lead the learning, and are looking forward to teaching students about thinking with a scientific mindset.

Baxter Elementary School Awarded School of Promising Practices

On the morning of March 18, Baxter Elementary received the School of Promising Practices Award from Solution Tree. Bryce Amos, State Office Executive Director, presented the staff with the Promising Practices certificate and flag.

Promising Practices is a solid initial step to becoming a Model PLC (Professional Learning Community) at Work school. Promising Practices schools have strong evidence of the solid foundation required to become a Model PLC at Work and share at least one year of data that shows student achievement growth. Model PLC at Work schools and districts have committed to the PLC at Work process, which is ingrained into the day-to-day culture of the school or district. Model schools and districts provide at least three years of data showing evidence of student achievement growth.

Several years ago, the elementary had been given a "priority" status as a school in need of assistance from the state to increase achievement scores. Since that time, the staff has worked diligently in partnership with Solution Tree to streamline their work as collaborative teams in focusing on getting the student learning results from instruction. We are so proud of the staff's commitment and dedication to continuous improvement. They are well on their way to becoming a Model School. GO BOLTS!



A Message

Dear Baxter Community, Parents, Staff and Students:

I have been dreading sitting down and writing this last newsletter article. It is probably because it is one of the final steps in an amazing journey. It is one of those tasks that makes me reflect on just how lucky and blessed I have been to call Baxter CSD home for 27 years. The average tenure of high school principals who stay at one school is between 3-4 years. I have skewed that data point. In 1997, Baxter was just going to be a stopping point in my 3-4 year plan, after which I would move on. Then something amazing happened. I got to know the people in this school and community. I was supported, mentored, embraced, and loved. I joke that as a principal and even more to double as a coach if you can stay on the good side of 51% of the people, you are ahead of the curve. I am not sure, but it has felt like way more than 51%.

I remember my parents always telling me not to look for a job but to find a career. There are so many people who helped me make this a fantastic career. There are way too many people to mention all of them. You think as an educator, your main focus is to make a difference in the lives of others. What I appreciated about all 4 of these people was they gave me the freedom to lead my building and supported me.

Another fantastic data point is that, in 27 years, I have only had two secretaries: Rachel McKibbin and Angie Wesselink. I consider myself incredibly lucky to work beside both of these women. They are amazing people and have such ownership of our school. They each did so much to improve our school.

I wrote last month about the impact of all the teachers I have worked with here. But there have also been so many other people who made coming to work each day fun. I thank all of you who made me smile, laugh, scream and helped me be a better principal. Thank you to all the elementary principals, support staff, nurses, custodians, office staff, bus drivers, cooks, board members, volunteers, coaches, AEA staff, parents, students, and community members. Never underestimate the impact you have on people. It doesn't matter if it is a week or a lifetime; you may never know it, but all of it matters.

As I reflect, there have been so many highs and lows. I have always coached and tried to model the phrase, don't let the highs be too high and lows be too low. The low points that will never leave me are the ones where we lost part of our Baxter family way too soon. Our school will always remember Ronan, Landon, Kirsten, Mira, Jake, and Sandi.

The highs begin with all we have accomplished: The BOLTS, a top state academic ranking, a new high school, a new gym and athletic facility, college credit increases, the middle school concept, a career academy, and so many more. But the true highs are the relationships that were built. It is the school pride. It is seeing a student be a successful citizen, employee, spouse, and parent. Isn't that really why we are in business?

Class of 2024, I hope we have helped you build a foundation that will allow you to chase your dreams. A wonderful world awaits you and needs you. Remember your roots. You will always have a home at Baxter HS. Let the journey be your happiness.

We proudly display our Promising Practices Flag outside our elementary office as a daily reminder of the hard work and commitment to our student's learning.

For those with a 3rd-5th grade student, we will take the ISASP tests on April 9- April 12. Third, Fourth, and Fifth-grade students will take standardized tests in reading, language arts, and math. Fifth graders will also take a science test. We will provide breakfast each day for those grade levels and do everything we can to help them have a positive mindset going into the tests. Please know you can support students at home by ensuring a good night's sleep and reiterating giving their best effort. This test will provide proficiency and growth data about our students. The test is not timed, so please encourage your student to take their time, read each question and answer, Elementary Principal and implement any test-taking strategies they have learned. Please ask them how they think the testing went, celebrate the successes you hear, and encourage them to continue giving their best effort.

There are still lots of upcoming events planned for our elementary school. If you have an incoming Kindergarten student, there will be an informational parent meeting on April 9th from 6:00-7:00 PM in the East Commons. Also, Kindergarten Round-up is on April 19th, so current Kindergarten students will have NO SCHOOL that day. At this event, current PK students spend a day in kindergarten doing some testing and familiarizing themselves with their upcoming classrooms. Our preschool open house will be on May 21st from 5:00-6:30 PM. This event will be for students entering 4-year-old preschool in the incoming students and look forward to meeting them and their parents.

More upcoming events include Ag Safety Day on April 5th. High School students will lead stations about animals, machines, and education. May 2nd will be our Elementary Spring Concert held in the East Gym. Track and Field day is set for the afternoon of May 10th. More information will be sent out about this, but parents are always encouraged to come out and enjoy the fun. Each grade level has some upcoming field trips, so please be on the lookout for emails/ communications from your classroom teachers.

MCC Career Expo

The Baxter freshman class attended a Career Expo hosted at Marshalltown Community College in late March. Students were given the option of attending morning sessions that were highlighted by the following programs: business, manufacturing, agriculture, automotive tech, art, athletic training, broadcasting, networking, construction, cosmetology, court reporting, criminal justice, military, nursing, social work, E-Sports/management. One goal of our district is to expose students to a variety of career pathways. The MCC Career Expo does a great job of exposing students to new possibilities and the type of training they will need to be successful.

National Honor Society

Health and Wellness

A child's body needs water to be healthy and active. Many communities have tap (faucet) water with fluoride. Giving children water with fluoride is one of the best ways to keep their teeth healthy. When children drink water with fluoride throughout the day, their teeth are bathed in low levels of fluoride, which helps to keep teeth strong.

Tips for encouraging your child to drink water:

- Make drinking water fun for your child. Use bendy, silly, or colored straws. Or let your child choose their favorite cups or water bottles.
- Use water bottles that can be carried anywhere. Refill them with tap water. Most bottled water does not have fluoride.
- Add a lemon, lime, or orange slice or fresh mint leaves to the water. Or add fruit like blueberries, raspberries, or strawberries.
- Give your child water with ice cubes or crushed ice. Look for ice cube trays in fun shapes like dinosaurs, letters, or animals.
- Be a good role model for your child. Drink water instead of drinks that have sugar, like juice, fruit drinks, soda (pop), or sports drinks.
- Set up a station where your child can get a drink of water when they are thirsty. Keep a nonbreakable water pitcher or thermos on a low stool or a chair where your child can reach it.
- Read books or show your child videos about drinking water, for example, *Potter the Otter: A Tale About Water* and *Potter the Otter Loves to Drink Water*.

LOOKING AHEAD TO THE 2024-2025 SCHOOL YEAR

Please note that if your child is in the following grades, they need specific health screenings. Please reach out if you have any questions.

-7th Graders-

All students entering 7th grade must have proof of having the Meningococcal and Tdap vaccine before school starts in August unless the student has a Certificate of Immunization Exemption (medical or religious) on file.

-Seniors-

Students entering 12th grade need proof of two doses of the Meningococcal vaccine. Now is an excellent time for your child to receive these immunization requirements and beat the backto-school rush.

Vision Screening

- No earlier than 1 year prior and no later than 6 months after enrollment
- Can be provided by ophthalmologist or optometrist or pediatrician's or family practice physician's office, a free clinic, a child care center, a local public health department, a public or accredited nonpublic school, or a community-based organization or by an advanced registered nurse practitioner or physician assistant
- Submitted electronically through IRIS or hard copy (no required form)

9th Grade

Dental Screening

- No earlier than 1 year prior to enrollment and no later than 4 months after enrollment
- Must be provided by licensed dentist or dental hygienist
- · Must use IDPH Certificate of **Dental Screening**

Schools are a critical partner in ensuring students are healthy and ready to learn. It is important to link students with available services to provide the best opportunity for the student to succeed. In lowa, there are four health screening programs regulated by the state and implemented by the schools: immunization, dental, vision and blood lead.

Dental Screening

- No earlier than age 3 and no later than 4 months after enrollment
- Can be provided by a licensed dentist, dental hygienist, physician, physician assistant, registered nurse or ARNP
- Must use IDPH Certificate of Dental Screening

Vision Screening

- No earlier than 1 year prior and no later than 6 months after enrollment
- Can be provided by ophthalmologist or optometrist or pediatrician's or family practice physician's office, a free clinic, a child care center. a local public health department, a public or accredited nonpublic school, or a communitybased organization or by an advanced registered nurse practitioner or physician assistant
- Submitted electronically through IRIS or hard copy (no required form)

Lead Screening

- At least one Blood Lead Test should occur prior to six years of age
- List of students supplied by school districts to IDPH within 60 days of enrollement

BAXTER COMMUNITY SCHOOL DISTRICT --- PARENT/GUARDIAN NOTICE SECTION 504 OF THE REHABILITATION ACT OF 1973

Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 prohibits discrimination against persons with a disability in any program receiving federal financial assistance. In order to fulfill obligations under Section 504, the Baxter Community School District has the responsibility to avoid discrimination in policies and practices regarding its personnel and students. No discrimination against any person with a disability should knowingly be permitted in any of the programs and practices of the school system.

The Baxter Community School District has the responsibilities under Section 504, which included the obligations to identify, evaluate, and, if the student is determined to be eligible under Section 504, to afford access to appropriate educational services.

If the parent/guardian disagrees with the determination made by the professional staff of the school district, he/she has a right to file a grievance and to a hearing with an impartial hearing officer.

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) also specifies rights related to educational records. This Act gives the parent or guardian the right to:

1) Inspect and review his/her child's educational records; 2) Make copies of these records; 3) Receive a list of the individuals having access to those records; 4) Ask for an explanation of any item in the records; 5) Ask for an amendment to any report on the grounds that it is inaccurate, misleading, or violates the child's rights; and 6) A hearing on the issue if the school refuses to make the amendment.
