Do you have a concern? Follow these steps for effective resolution.

Step #1:

Take your concern to the most relevant person.

Whether in the classroom, on the bus, or on the practice field, the quickest and easiest solution typically involves speaking to the staff member most directly involved.

Best practice includes taking time to talk with the school personnel regularly before problems are encountered. Know who your children's teachers are and how they can be contacted. Tell them when things are going well and communicate any concerns you have quickly and openly. If you call for an appointment to see your child's teachers, let them know in advance the general nature of your concern to give them the opportunity to gather pertinent information relating to your concern. If a personal visit isn't possible, call to state the concern, and offer to call back at a time you both can discuss the situation in more detail. The concern you or your child faces may be a result of an oversight or a misunderstanding that can be easily corrected once brought to the attention of the staff member most directly involved. Give them a chance to tackle the problem first.

Step #2:

Present your concern to the next level.

The principal at each building is responsible for supervision of staff within that particular building. The director of transportation supervises all school bus drivers. These are examples of the next level of personnel to contact should the staff member closest to the concern not be able to satisfactorily offer resolution. Their ability to help will be improved if you share the steps you have already taken with the staff member closest to the concern. Take time to share with them the reason(s) you feel uncomfortable dealing directly with the person who is closest to the situation. Supervisory personnel will rarely have access to the information they need to be of immediate assistance and working through them will often require additional time.

Step #3:

Talk with the superintendent of schools.

Sometimes all the best intentions can't solve a problem. When you believe you have taken the concern to the next level but still haven't achieved a satisfactory outcome, the superintendent of schools is the next place to go. A meeting with the superintendent will require some advance planning.



Step #4:

Contact your school board member after other means have been attempted.

School board members are elected to represent the interest of all parents and district residents; therefore, you should always feel free to tell them your point of view. However, school board members do not have direct authority in day-to-day operations. All authority is the result of official actions by a majority of the board at meetings open to the public. The board's primary responsibility is to make policies that guide the school district. Any change in policy requires two readings at two separate public meetings, a procedure that often takes two or more months. Some policy changes may require substantial public input and consultation with the school district's attorney. These requirements often increase the time required for the board to make a response.

When should a board member be contacted and what can they do?

- · After other means to solve a problem have been tried.
- · When a policy is being enforced but you believe it results in bad consequences.
- · When you believe a policy isn't being enforced.
- When policies or procedures are not enforced fairly for all.

A board member may take one or all of the following actions:

- Informally discuss the issue with the superintendent to consider whether policies or rules would be changed.
- Request to the board president to review the specific policies that relate to the situation.
- Propose new policies for the board's consideration.

AMESSAGE CAMERON August is a fantastic time to be an educator. As the new school year begins, there's a noticeable excitement in the air—whether it's starting anew or, for some, starting for the first time. Activities are about to start up again in the upcoming weeks and the first day of school is right around the corner. As my second year at Baxter is officially beginning, I want to reflect on a variety of changes that we have made to both our student and standards-referenced grading (SRG) handbooks.

In our student handbook, we added some regulations surrounding the use of artificial intelligence (AI). The use of AI connects very closely to academic honesty and giving our own efforts. Another huge adjustment is the fact that we will be adding mid-term grade checks in both semesters. On October 17, we will pull updated grades from JMC. At that point, if a student were to have a failing grade, they will be ineligible until they can prove that the grade is now passing.

On a lighter note, seniors that qualify may have open campus over the lunch period. We will be talking more about this when school begins. Our student handbook will be posted to the new school website soon!

When it comes to SRG, there were some parameters that needed to be addressed. Students can still attempt a reassessment after a unit concludes. However, all reassessments are limited to being done two weeks after the unit ends. Students will be required to formally request a reassessment and will have to work with each individual teacher to identify how that will look in that class. We will continue to talk about these changes as we move forward.

Baxter Schools are remarkable, and this excellence starts with the outstanding people throughout the community. Building strong relationships between our school and your homes is crucial for fostering our students' growth and success. Relationships are built through one interaction at a time, and there are multiple ways to make that happen - our open house will be on August 21 from 6:00-7:30 p.m., there are also numerous events through extra-curricular and sporting events, parent-teacher conferences and more. In the meantime, please feel free to reach out anytime; we are here to support everyone on their journey to becoming "empowered to acquire the skills for personal success in an ever-changing world!"

In accordance with state and federal law, the Baxter Community School District adopts the following policy to ensure school district employees, families, and students have a shared understanding of expectations regarding meal charges. The policy seeks to allow students to receive the nutrition they need to stay focused during the school day, prevent the overt identification of students with insufficient funds to pay for school meals, and maintain the financial integrity of the nonprofit school nutrition program.

Breakfast and Lunch Policy-Staff & Grades K-12

Students have a meal account. When the balance reaches a <u>negative</u> (-\$25.00) balance, a student shall not be allowed to charge a la carte/extra items until the negative account balance is paid. Parents/guardians may use the online payment system; or deposit cash or check into the family account by paying at the secondary principal's office. Parents/Guardians may choose to prohibit purchasing meals and/or a la carte/extra items resulting in extra charges to meal accounts at any time by contacting the food service director.

All free/reduced/paying students shall never be denied a reimbursable meal, due to a negative balance from previous purchases. The meal account, however, will continue to be charged for meals and/or a la carte/extra items, if applicable.

Employees may use a charge account for meals, but may charge no more than \$10.00 to this account. When an account reaches this limit, an employee shall not be allowed to charge further meals or a la carte items until the negative account balance is paid.

Parents/Guardians will be reminded on a weekly basis, by automated notice, of their low/negative family account balance.

Adults/Parents/Guardians are encouraged to maintain a positive account balance. We encourage parents/guardians to use the online payment system to deposit funds into their family account.

The school district will make reasonable efforts to notify families when meal account balances are low. Additionally, the school district will make reasonable efforts to collect unpaid meal charges classified as delinquent debt. The school district will coordinate communications with families to resolve the matter of unpaid charges.

Upon reaching a <u>negative</u> (-\$25.00) balance or greater, an automated notice, email, letter, or phone call from the food service director, or designee, to the parent/guardian, will occur informing them of the negative account. A free/reduced application will also be sent if the parent/guardian has not already applied.

If payment is still not made after reaching a <u>negative</u> (-\$125.00) balance, the parent will receive a certified letter from the business office. The letter will state a due date to bring the account positive and/or request the parent/guardian communicate, by phone call or in writing, to devise a plan for repayment.

A contact from the food service cashier will continue to be made weekly for any negative balances.

The Superintendent and/or building principal may call any families with <u>negative</u> (-\$150) balances or more.

Any communication from the parent/guardian to the food service director or business office may take precedence over the normal procedures established for a negative meal account.

Unpaid Student Meal Accounts

The district may establish an unpaid student meals account. Funds donated from community/private sources may be deposited into the account in accordance with the law. Funds deposited into this account shall be used only to pay student meal debt.

Negative balances will be carried over to the following school year. These negative balances must be paid in full prior to school starting as part of the school registration process. The school district and the Food Service department reserve the right to take any additional action, including legal action or collection services, after normal procedures have failed and the account is 60 days delinquent and/or has reached a negative (-\$200.00) balance, to collect the balance due in any student's account.

The policy and supporting information regarding meal charges shall be provided in writing to:

- All households at or before the start of each school year;
- Students and families who transfer into the district, at time of transfer; and
- All staff responsible for enforcing any aspect of the policy.

Records of how and when the policy and supporting information was communicated to households and staff will be retained.

The superintendent may develop an administrative process to implement this policy.

Dear Parent/Guardian:

Children need healthy meals to learn. Baxter CSD offers healthy meals every school day. Breakfast costs \$1.90; lunch costs \$3.00-Elementary/\$3.10-Secondary. Your children may qualify for free meals/milk or for reduced price meals. Reduced price is \$.30 for breakfast and \$.40 for lunch. Please visit our website to complete an application at: jmc.remily.com (onlinejmc.com). Once logged in to your family's portal for the 2025-2026 school year, select registration, apply for educational benefits.

Below are some common questions and answers to help you with the application process.

- 1. WHO CAN GET FREE OR REDUCED PRICE MEALS?
 - All children in households receiving benefits from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), the Family Investment Program (FIP) or a few specific Medicaid programs are eligible for free or reduced price meals.
 - Foster children that are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court are eligible for free meals.
 - Children participating in their school's Head Start program are eligible for free meals.
 - Children who meet the definition of homeless, runaway, or migrant are eligible for free meals.
 - Children may receive free or reduced price meals if your household's income is at or below the limits on the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines below and apply for free and reduced price meals/milk.

- 2. SHOULD I FILL OUT AN APPLICATION IF I RECEIVED A LETTER THIS SCHOOL YEAR SAYING MY CHILDREN ARE ALREADY APPROVED FOR FREE OR REDUCED PRICE MEALS? No, but please read the letter carefully and follow the instructions. If any children in your household were missing from your notification, contact: Tasha McPherson, 202 E. State St., Baxter, IA 50028, (641) 227-1134, tmcpherson@baxter.k12.ia.us immediately as eligibility for free or reduced price meals is extended to all school age children in a household. If you did not receive a letter from the school, but received a Free Lunch Notice from the Iowa Department of Health and Human Services (Iowa HHS), submit this letter to your children's school. You may add any students living in your household who are not listed on the letter. Also, if someone in your household receives SNAP or FIP benefits and you did not receive either of these letters, you may complete an application listing the case number as this will qualify all school age children in your household for free meals. If you were informed that your children will get reduced price meals, see the income guidelines above and if you feel you would qualify for free meal benefits, complete an application for free and reduced price meals.
- 3. WHAT IF WE HAVE FOSTER CHILDREN? Households with foster and non-foster children may choose to include the foster child as a household member, as this may help other children in the household qualify for benefits. If the foster family is not eligible for free or reduced price meal benefits, that does not prevent a foster child from receiving free meal benefits.
- 4. HOW DO I KNOW IF MY CHILDREN QUALIFY AS HOMELESS, MIGRANT OR RUNAWAY? Do the members of your household lack a permanent address? Are you staying together in a shelter, hotel, or other temporary housing arrangement? Does your family relocate on a seasonal basis? Are any children living with you who have chosen to leave their prior family or household? If you believe children in your household meet these descriptions and haven't been told your children will get free meals, please contact: Baxter CSD, Travis Dee, (641) 227-1409, tdee@baxter.k12.ia.us

- 5. DO I NEED TO FILL OUT AN APPLICATION FOR EACH CHILD? No, complete the applications for free and reduced price school meals for all the students in your household. We cannot approve an application unless complete eligibility information is submitted, so be sure to complete all required information.
- 6. MY CHILD'S APPLICATION WAS APPROVED LAST YEAR. DO I NEED TO FILL OUT A NEW ONE? Yes, your child's application is only good for that school year and for the first few days of this school year, through October 14, 2025. You must complete a new application unless the school told you that your child is eligible for the new school year. When the carryover period ends, unless you are notified that your children will receive free meals or you submit an application that is approved, the children must pay full price for school meals. The school is not required to send a reminder or a notice of expired eligibility.
- 7. I GET WIC. CAN MY CHILDREN GET FREE MEALS? Children in households participating in WIC <u>may</u> be eligible for free or reduced price meals. Please complete and send in an application.
- 8. MAY I APPLY IF SOMEONE IN MY HOUSEHOLD IS NOT A U.S. CITIZEN? Yes, you, your children or other household members do not have to be U.S. citizens to apply for free or reduced price meals.
- 9. WILL THE INFORMATION I GIVE BE CHECKED? Yes, we may also ask you to send written proof of the household income you report. You are not required to provide proof with your application.
- 10. IF I DON'T QUALIFY NOW, MAY I APPLY LATER? Yes, you may apply at any time during the school year. For example, children with a parent or guardian who becomes unemployed may become eligible for free or reduced price meals if the household income drops below the income limit, if your household size goes up, or if you start getting SNAP, FIP or other benefits.
- 11. WHAT IF I DISAGREE WITH THE SCHOOL'S DECISION ABOUT MY APPLICATION? You should talk to your school officials. You also may ask for a hearing by calling or writing to: Chris Petersen, 202 E. State St., P.O. Box 189, Baxter, IA 50028, (641) 227-3102, cpetersen@baxter.k12.ia.us
- 12. WHAT IF MY INCOME IS NOT ALWAYS THE SAME? List the amount that you normally receive. For example, if you normally make \$1000 each month, but you missed some work last month and only made \$900, put down that you made \$1000 per month. If you normally get overtime, include it, but do not include it if you only work overtime sometimes. If you have lost a job or had your hours or wages reduced, use your current income.
- 13. WHAT IF SOME HOUSEHOLD MEMBERS HAVE NO INCOME TO REPORT? Household members may not receive the types of income we ask you to report on the application, or may not receive income at all. Whenever this happens, please write a 0 in the field. However, if any income fields are left empty or blank, those will also be counted as zeroes. Please be careful when leaving income fields blank, as we will assume you meant to do so.
- 14. WE ARE IN THE MILITARY. DO WE REPORT OUR INCOME DIFFERENTLY? Your basic pay and cash bonuses must be reported as income. If you get any cash value allowances for off-base housing, food or clothing, or receive Family Subsistence Supplemental Allowance payments, it must also be included as income. However, if your housing is part of the Military Housing Privatization Initiative, do not include your housing allowance as income. Any additional combat pay resulting from deployment is also excluded from income.
- 15. DO I NEED TO PROVIDE MY SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER? Only the last four digits of the Social Security Number of the household's primary wage earner or another adult household member (or an indication of "none") is needed.
- 16. WHAT IF THERE ISN'T ENOUGH SPACE ON THE APPLICATION FOR MY FAMILY? List any additional household members on a Supplemental Worksheet and attach it to your application. Contact Tasha McPherson, 202 E. State St., Baxter, IA 50028, (641) 227-1134, tmcpherson@baxter.k12.ia.us to receive a Supplemental Worksheet.
- 17. WHO CAN GET FREE MILK? If your school participates in the Special Milk Program for half day kindergarteners, your kindergarten child may be eligible for free milk. Children who buy extra milk with a meal or if they eat breakfast or lunch and have an afternoon milk break, are not eligible to receive free milk.
- 18. MY FAMILY NEEDS MORE HELP. ARE THERE OTHER PROGRAMS WE MIGHT APPLY FOR? To find out how to apply for SNAP or other assistance benefits, contact your local assistance office or call **1-877-347-5678**. Your children may be eligible for Hawki (children's health insurance) or a waiver of school fees. Read the information on the back of the Application for Hawki information. A school waiver form is available from your school.

- 19. CAN CHILDREN WITH DISABILITIES GET FOOD SUBSTITUTIONS? If a child has a disability, as determined by a licensed medical professional, and the disability prevents the child from eating the regular school meal, the school will make substitutions prescribed by the licensed medical professional. If a substitution is needed, there will be no extra charge for the meal. Please note, however, that the school is not required to make a substitution for a food allergy, unless it meets the definition of disability. Please call the school for further information.
- 20. DO I NEED TO REPORT MY RACE AND ETHNICITY? It is optional to complete the racial/ethnic portion of the application, however, if you do not select race or ethnicity, one will be selected for you based on visual observation.

Medication Policy

Health care of the school-age child is the responsibility of the parent. Parents are advised to give medication at home outside school hours. (For example: If a medication is to be given three times a day, it can be given before school, after school, and at bed time.)

It is recognized that there may be certain medications which must be given during the day to strengthen the educational process. In these cases, parents are advised to comply with the following guidelines. These guidelines are established to safeguard students and school personnel.

When a student must take medication during school hours, the student and parent shall be responsible for the following:

A. Both prescription and over-the-counter medications shall be kept in the original container. Pharmacies will split prescriptions upon request. (Pills brought to school in envelopes or other containers will not be given.) Prescription medications shall be labeled with:

- a) Name of student
- b) Name of medication
- c) Directions for use
- d) Name of physician
- e) Name and address of pharmacy
- f) Date of prescription

Over-the-counter medications (non-prescription) shall be labeled with:

- a) Name of student
- b) Name of medication
- c) Directions for use be provided to the school including name of medication, dosage, and time of day to be given. (Please use form included with newsletter.)
- D. Medication should be delivered to the Superintendent's office and picked up by the parent, unless other arrangements (such as a phone call) have been made with the superintendent, principal, or school RN. During the school year, all medications not claimed by parent within 30 days of completion of approved administration shall be destroyed. At the end of the school year, medications remaining will be destroyed one week after classes end. The school nurse shall destroy the medication with a faculty witness, and this shall be documented in the record.
- E. A record shall be maintained each time a medication is administered to include pupil's name, date, time, and signature of the person administering the medication.
- F. Medication will be properly stored in a designated locked area. Medications requiring refrigeration are stored in a designated space in refrigerator.
- G. School personnel who are not otherwise authorized to administer medication shall successfully complete a medication administration course approved by the Department of Education. The school nurse shall be responsible for instructing personnel in the course and conducting review sessions. Upon completion of the course, personnel may administer non-parental medications (oral, topical, and eye/ear drops). Inhalers and injections must be administered by the nurse or self-administered in the presence of the nurse or medication aide. Student controlled use of inhaler and emergency injections such as Epi-pen will be evaluated between school nurse, parents, and physician on an individual basis.



BAXTER SCHOOL BUS CODE OF CONDUCT

The safety of students and drivers is our number one concern. The Baxter Community School safety and usage policies regarding our buses follow. Please take a moment to review this information with all student riders. Students found in default of any of the following School Bus Code of Conduct policies are subject to the misbehavior consequences that follow.

While on the Bus

- · Respect your driver always!
- · Stay in your seat. Sit on your bottom.
- Keep the center aisle clear of backpacks and equipment.
- Dispose of all trash in garbage pails.
- · Do not throw anything out the windows.

The Following Behavior is STRICTLY PROHIBITED

- · Violation of safety procedures
- Destruction of property
- · Inappropriate physical contact (fighting, pushing, tripping, etc.) or threats
- · Excessive mischief
- Smoking and/or Vaping
- Rude, discourteous and/or bothersome behavior
- Unacceptable and/or offensive language

POSSIBLE CONSEQUENCES:

First Offense: Verbal warning and building principal notified. Parent notified.

Second Offense: Loss of bus riding privileges for up to three (3) days. Parent notified.

Third Offense: Loss of bus riding privileges for up to 10 school days. The bus driver and principal may request a conference with the student and parent. Parent notified.

Fourth Offense: Loss of bus riding privileges for an indefinite period of time, possible recommendation for long-term bus suspension. Parent will be notified.

Severe Violation: Any violation determined to be severe will give the Administrator the option of taking disciplinary action at any step. Although this is not a complete list, examples of severe violations could include: fighting, weapons or look-alike weapons, alcohol, smoking, drugs, verbal or physical battery, and sexual harassment. Such infractions will not only result in suspension from transportation but may also result in disciplinary action at the school. Any previously issued notices for bus misconduct will be considered when determining the discipline for a student having committed a severe act.

As an extension of the classroom, the building principal reserves the right to discipline students using consequences that are age appropriate. This may include loss of recess/privileges, detention, in-school suspension, or out-of-school suspension.



Homeless Children and Youth

The Baxter Community School District makes a reasonable effort to identify homeless children and youth of school age within the district, encourage their enrollment, and eliminate existing barriers to their receiving their education.

A homeless child is defined as a child or youth between the ages of 5 and 21 who lacks a fixed, regular and adequate nighttime residence and includes a child or youth who is living on the street, in a car, tent, or abandoned building or some other form of shelter not designed as a permanent home; who is living in a community shelter facility; or who is living with non-nuclear family members or with friends, who may or may not have legal guardianship over the child or youth of school age.

<u>School Records:</u> Students transferring out of the district, records may be provided directly to the student or the student's parents. Students transferring into the district may provide records directly to the district. The school will not require that records be forwarded from another school prior to the student's enrollment. The school will then request the official records from the previous school.

Immunization Requirements: Homeless students will not be denied enrollment for lack of immunization records if:

- 1. student has a statement signed by a physician stating that immunization would be injurious to the student;
- 2. student provides an affidavit stating such immunization would conflict with their religious beliefs;
- 3. student is in the process of being immunized; or
- 4. student has transfer records from another school.

The district will make a reasonable effort to locate immunization records from the information provided or will arrange for the student to receive immunizations.

<u>Waiver of Fees and Charges</u>: Fees and charges which may present a barrier to the enrollment of transfer of a homeless child or youth maybe waived in the discretion of the superintendent. Enrollment Requirements/Placement.

<u>Enrollment requirements</u>, which may constitute a barrier to the education of the homeless child or youth, may be waived in the discretion of the superintendent. In the event that records are incomplete and a grade level cannot be determined, the district will administer tests to determine the appropriate grade level.

<u>Residency:</u> Homeless students and youth will attend the district where the child resides or the child's school district of origin. A child's school district of origin is the school district where the child was last enrolled. The deciding factor is the welfare of the child.

<u>Transportation</u>: the superintendent may waive policies or practices regarding transportation of students, which might cause a barrier to the attendance of a homeless child or youth.

<u>Special Services:</u> All services, which are available to resident students, are made available to homeless children and youths enrolled in the school district. Services include special education, talented and gifted programs, vocational education, English as a second language programs, health services and food and nutrition programs. Post-Secondary Enrollment Options Act

The Post-Secondary Enrollment Options Act is intended to promote rigorous academic pursuits and to provide a wider variety of options to high school students by enabling eleventh and twelfth grade students to enroll part time in non-sectarian courses in eligible post-secondary institutions of higher learning. Courses students enroll in must not be offered by the local school district. The local school district will pay for each separate course, the lesser of the actual and customary cost of tuition, textbooks, materials, and fees directly relative to the course taken by the eligible student or \$250.

AHERA Compliance

The Baxter Community School District maintains a current Asbestos Management Plan that is available to all employees, parents, and interested patrons. The management plan is located in the central office and is available for inspection during regular school hours. The Baxter School complex is located at 202 E. State Street, Baxter, Iowa 50028. Questions regarding this management plan and/or compliance with AHERA regulations may be directed to Superintendent of Schools, or by calling 641-227-3102.

Student Fee Waiver and Reduction Procedures

Students whose families meet the income guidelines for free and reduced price lunch, the Family Investment Program (FIP), Supplemental Security Income (SSI), transportation assistance under open enrollment, or who are in foster care are eligible to have their student fees waived or partially waived. Students whose families are experiencing a temporary financial difficulty may be eligible for a temporary waiver of student fees. Parents or students who believe they may qualify for temporary financial hardship should contact the principal's secretary during registration or by August 31st annually for a waiver form. This waiver does not carry over from year to year and must be requested and completed annually.

Use of Information Resources

In order for students to experience a diverse curriculum, the board encourages employees to supplement their regular curricular materials with other resources. In so doing, the board recognizes that federal law makes it illegal to duplicate copyrighted materials without authorization of the holder of the copyright, except for certain exempt purposes. Severe penalties may be imposed for plagiarism, unauthorized copying or using of media, including, but not limited to, print, electronic and web-based materials, unless the copying or using conforms to the "fair use" doctrine. Under the "fair use" doctrine, unauthorized reproduction of copyrighted materials is permissible for such purposes as criticism, comment, news reporting, teaching, scholarship or research providing that all fair use guidelines are met.

While the school district encourages employees to enrich the learning programs by making proper use of supplementary materials, it is the responsibility of employees to abide by the school district's copying procedures and obey the requirements of the law. In no circumstances shall it be necessary for school district staff to violate copyright requirements in order to perform their duties properly. The school district will not be responsible for any violations of the copyright law by employees or students. Violation of the copyright law by employees may result in discipline up to, and including, termination. Violation of the copyright law by students may result in discipline, up to and including, suspension or expulsion.

Parents or others who wish to record, by any means, school programs or other activities need to realize that even though the school district received permission to perform a copyrighted work does not mean outsiders can copy it and re-play it. Those who wish to do so should contact the employee in charge of the activity to determine what the process is to ensure the copyright law is followed. The school district is not responsible for outsiders violating the copyright law or this policy.

Any employee or student who is uncertain as to whether reproducing or using copy-righted material complies with the school district's procedures or is permissible under the law should contact the principal, teacher or librarian who will also assist employees and students in obtaining proper authorization to copy or use protected material when such authorization is required.

No Child Left Behind Notification to Parents

As parents/guardians in the Baxter Community School District, you have the right to information regarding your child's teacher's qualifications, state licensure status, special endorsements for grade level/subject areas taught, and baccalaureate/graduate certification/degree.

Parents/Guardians may request this information from the Office of the Superintendent by calling 641-227-3102 or sending a letter of request to Office of the Superintendent, 202 E. State Street, Baxter, Iowa 50028.

The Baxter Community School District ensures that parents will be notified in writing if their child has been assigned or has been taught by a teacher for four or more consecutive weeks by a teacher who is not considered highly qualified.

PROTECTION OF THE RIGHTS AND PRIVACY OF PARENTS AND STUDENTS AND DISSEMINATION OF STUDENT RECORDS Code No. 505.2

The board recognizes the importance of maintaining student records and preserving their confidentiality.

All student records containing personally identifiable information shall be kept confidential at collection, storage, disclosure, and destruction stages. Student records shall be maintained by the records custodian and housed accordingly. The records custodian shall assume responsibility for ensuring the confidentiality of any personally identifiable information. The district personnel who collect or use personally identifiable information shall receive training or instruction regarding confidentiality of personally identifiable information.

- 1. The school may, without the consent of either the parent or the student, if the student is eighteen or older, release student records to school officials who have a legitimate educational interest in examining the information; or to officials of other schools or school systems in which the student intends to enroll, in which case the student parents must be notified of the release of records and provided a copy of the released if they so request.
- 2. A student's parents or guardian may have access to permanent and supplementary records at reasonable times. A parent or guardian is also entitled to see tentative records. If a student is eighteen years of age, the parents' access to records is subject to the student's written consent.
- 3. A student who has reached the age of eighteen may examine his or her records at reasonable times. For purposes of this policy, whenever a student has attained eighteen years of age, the permission or consent required of and the rights accorded to the parents of the student shall thereafter only be required of and accorded to the student.
- 4. A school official competent in interpreting student records shall be present to explain the meaning and implications of the records that are examined.
- 5. The parents shall have the right to make written objections to any information contained in the records. Any written objection shall be signed by the parent and dated, and it shall become part of the student's supplementary record. Parents shall have an opportunity for a hearing to challenge the content of school records.
- 6. School officials shall not furnish in any form any personal or identifiable information contained in personal school records to any person other than those heretofore listed unless:
 - a. There is written consent from the student's parents specifying records to be released, the reasons for such release, and to whom, and with a copy of the records to be released to the student's parents and the student if desired by the parent, or
 - b. Such information is furnished in compliance with judicial order or pursuant to any lawfully-issued subpoena, upon condition that parents and the students are notified of all such orders or subpoenas in advance of the compliance therewith by the school officials.
 - c. In an emergency situation when the student or parents cannot be reached, the principal or superintendent may, at their discretion, release information as needed for health and/or safety of individuals.
 - d. When data for outside research purposes or to comply with requests of any state or federal agency is released, it shall be in such a form that no individual student is identifiable.
- 7. All persons, agencies, or organizations desiring access to the records of a student shall be required to sign a written form which shall be kept permanently with the file of the student.
- 8. The right of inspection may be exercised only during customary office hours of the school district, and the school district may charge a reasonable fee for copies which are made of student records.
- 9. If the superintendent has special information which indicates that granting or denying access to a student's record would be harmful to the student, the superintendent may exercise discretion in granting or denying access to a student's record. The superintendent will also keep a list of individuals, agencies and organizations which have requested or obtained purpose for which they were authorized to view the records. The superintendent, however, does not need to keep a list of the parents, authorized educational employees, officers and agencies of the school district who have accessed the student's records.

CONTINUED...

This list for a student record may be accessed by the parents, the eligible student and the custodian of student records. Permanent student records, including a student's name, address, phone number, grades, attendance record, classes attended, grade level completed and year completed may be maintained without time limitation. Permanent student records will be kept in a fire-safe vault.

When personally identifiable information, other than permanent student records, no longer needs to be maintained by the school district to provide educational services to a special education student, the parents or eligible student are notified.

This notice is normally given after a student graduates or otherwise leaves the school district. If the parents or eligible student request that the personally identifiable information be destroyed, the school district will destroy the records. Prior to the destruction of the records, the school district must inform the parents or eligible student the records may be needed by the parents or eligible student for social security benefits or other purposes.

CORPORAL PUNISHMENT

Code No. 502.6

Corporal punishment may not be used to discipline students as the Board believes it does not deter disruptive behavior.

Pursuant to Iowa Code 280.21, school employees shall not inflict, or cause to be inflicted, corporal punishment upon a student. Corporal punishment means the intentional physical punishment of a student. An employees physical contact with the body of a student shall not be considered corporal punishment if it is reasonable and necessary under the circumstances and is not designed or intended to cause pain or if the employee uses reasonable force for the protection of the employee, the student, or other students; to obtain the possession of a weapon or other dangerous object within the students control; or for the protection of property.

A school employee who, in the reasonable course of their role and responsibilities, comes into contact with a student shall be granted immunity from civil and criminal liability as a result of such contact, if the contact is reasonable and under the circumstances and involves the following:

- Encouraging, supporting, or disciplining the student
- Protecting the employee, the student, or other students
- Obtaining possession of a weapon, or other dangerous object, within a student's control
- Protecting employee, student, or school property
- Quelling a disturbance or preventing an act of threatening physical harm to any person
- Removing a disruptive student from class or any area of the school premises, or from school sponsored activities off school premises
- Preventing a student from the self-infliction of harm
- Self-defense
- Any other legitimate educational activity

The student's parents shall be given an explanation of the reasonable physical force upon request. It shall be the responsibility of the superintendent to develop administrative regulations regarding this policy.

Harassment and bullying of students and employees are against federal, state and local policy, and are not tolerated by the board. The board is committed to providing all students with a safe and civil school environment in which all members of the school community are treated with dignity and respect. To that end, the board has in place policies, procedures, and practices that are designed to reduce and eliminate bullying and harassment as well as processes and procedures to deal with incidents of bullying and harassment. Bullying and harassment of students by students, school employees, and volunteers who have direct contact with students will not be tolerated in the school or school district. The board prohibits harassment, bullying, hazing, or any other victimization, of students, based on any of the following actual or perceived traits or characteristics, including but not limited to, age, color, creed, national origin, race, religion, marital status, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, physical attributes, physical or mental ability or disability, ancestry, political party preference, political belief, socioeconomic status, or familial status. Harassment against employees based upon race, color, creed, sex, sexual orientation, national origin, religion, age or disability is also prohibited.

This policy is in effect while students or employees are on property within the jurisdiction of the board; while on school-owned or school-operated vehicles; while attending or engaged in school-sponsored activities; and while away from school grounds if the misconduct directly affects the good order, efficient management and welfare of the school or school district.

If, after an investigation, a student is found to be in violation of this policy, the student shall be disciplined by appropriate measures up to, and including, suspension and expulsion. If after an investigation a school employee is found to be in violation of this policy, the employee shall be disciplined by appropriate measures up to, and including, termination. If after an investigation a school volunteer is found to be in violation of this policy, the volunteer shall be subject to appropriate measures up to, and including, exclusion from school grounds. "Volunteer" means an individual who has regular, significant contact with students.

Harassment and bullying mean any electronic, written, verbal, or physical act or conduct toward a student which is based on any actual or perceived trait or characteristic of the student and which creates an objectively hostile school environment that meets one or more of the following conditions:

- Places the student in reasonable fear of harm to the student's person or property;
- Has a substantially detrimental effect on the student's physical or mental health;
- Has the effect of substantially interfering with the student's academic performance; or
- Has the effect of substantially interfering with the student's ability to participate in or benefit from the services, activities, or privileges provided by a school.

"Electronic" means any communication involving the transmission of information by wire, radio, optical cable, electromagnetic, or other similar means. "Electronic" includes but is not limited to communication via electronic mail, internet-based communications, pager service, cell phones, electronic text messaging or similar technologies.

Harassment and bullying may include, but are not limited to, the following behaviors and circumstances:

- Verbal, nonverbal, physical or written harassment, bullying, hazing, or other victimization that have the purpose or effect of causing injury, discomfort, fear, or suffering to the victim;
- Repeated remarks of a demeaning nature that have the purpose or effect of causing injury, discomfort, fear, or suffering to the victim;
- Implied or explicit threats concerning one's grades, achievements, property, etc. that have the purpose or effect of causing injury, discomfort, fear, or suffering to the victim;
- Demeaning jokes, stories, or activities directed at the student that have the purpose or effect of causing injury, discomfort, fear, or suffering to the victim; and/or
- Unreasonable interference with a student's performance or creation of an intimidating, offensive, or hostile learning environment.

ANTI-BULLYING/HARASSMENT POLICY CONTINUED...

Sexual harassment means unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, or other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature when:

- Submission to the conduct is made either implicitly or explicitly a term or condition of the student's education or benefits;
- Submission to or rejection of the conduct by a school employee is used as the basis for academic decisions affecting that student; or
- The conduct has the purpose or effect of substantially interfering with the student's academic performance by creating an intimidating, hostile, or offensive education environment.

In situations between students and school officials, faculty, staff, or volunteers who have direct contact with students, bullying and harassment may also include the following behaviors:

- Requiring that a student submit to bullying or harassment by another student, either explicitly or implicitly, as a term or condition of the targeted student's education or participation in school programs or activities; and/or
- Requiring submission to or rejection of such conduct as a basis for decisions affecting the student.

Any person who promptly, reasonably, and in good faith reports an incident of bullying or harassment under this policy to a school official, shall be immune from civil or criminal liability relating to such report and to the person's participation in any administrative, judicial, or other proceeding relating to the report. Individuals who knowingly file a false complaint may be subject to appropriate disciplinary action.

Retaliation against any person, because the person has filed a bullying or harassment complaint or assisted or participated in a harassment investigation or proceeding, is also prohibited. Individuals who knowingly file false harassment complaints and any person who gives false statements in an investigation shall be subject to discipline by appropriate measures, as shall any person who is found to have retaliated against another in violation of this policy. Any student found to have retaliated in violation of this policy shall be subject to measures up to, and including, suspension and expulsion. Any school employee found to have retaliated in violation of this policy shall be subject to measures up to, and including, termination of employment. Any school volunteer found to have retaliated in violation of this policy shall be subject to measures up to, and including, exclusion from school grounds.

The school or school district will promptly and reasonably investigate allegations of bullying or harassment. The counselor or designee will be responsible for handling all complaints by students alleging bullying or harassment. The superintendent or designee will be responsible for handling all complaints by employees alleging bullying or harassment.

It also is the responsibility of the superintendent, in conjunction with the investigator and principals, to develop procedures regarding this policy. The superintendent, principals, and staff development coordinator will be responsible for organizing and implementing any training programs for students, school officials, faculty, staff, and volunteers who have direct contact with students. The training may include how to recognize harassment and what to do in case a student is harassed. It may also include proven effective harassment prevention strategies as well as a process for evaluating the effectiveness of the policy in reducing bullying and harassment in the school.

The board will annually publish this policy. The policy may be publicized by the following means:

- Inclusion in the student handbook,
- Inclusion in the employee handbook
- Inclusion in the registration materials
- Inclusion on the school or school district's web site.

COMPREHENSIVE EDUCATIONAL EQUITY POLICY

Code No. 204.26

It is the policy of the Baxter Community School District to provide equal educational and employment opportunities and not to illegally discriminate on the basis of sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, race, national origin, religion, age, marital status, color, creed, socioeconomic status, or disability in its educational programs, activities, or its employment and personnel policies. Reasonable affirmative steps shall be taken to integrate students in attendance centers, programs and classes on the basis of race, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, and disability.

This agency shall provide program activities, a curriculum and instructional resources which will reflect the racial and cultural diversity present in the United States and the variety of careers, roles and life styles open to both men and women in our society. One of the objectives of the agency's programs, curriculum, services and teaching strategies is to reduce stereotyping and to eliminate bias on the basis of sex, race, color, sexual orientation, gender identity, national origin, religion, age, marital status, socioeconomic status, or disability. The curriculum, programs and services shall foster respect and appreciation for the cultural diversity found in our country and an awareness of the rights, duties and responsibilities of each individual as a member of a pluralistic society.

It is the policy of this agency to affirmatively recruit women and men, members of diverse racial/ethnic groups and persons with disabilities for job categories where they are under represented. A fair and supportive environment will be provided for all students and employees regardless of their sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, race, national origin, creed, age, marital status or disability. Harassment of a sexual nature or with demeaning intent related to race, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, disability, age, marital status or religion, made from one employee to another, from an employee to a student or vice versa, and from one student to another is a violation of this policy. Inquiries by employees or applicants for employment regarding compliance with equal employment opportunity and affirmative action laws and policies, including but not limited to complaints of discrimination, will be directed to the Educational Equity Coordinator by writing to the Compliance Officer, Baxter Community School District, Baxter Iowa 50028; or by telephoning 641-227-3103.

Inquiries by employees or applicants for employment regarding compliance with equal employment opportunity and affirmative action laws and policies, including but not limited to complaints of discrimination, may also be directed in writing to the Director of the Region VII office of Civil Rights, U.S. Department of Education, 310 W. This inquiry or complaint to the federal office may be done instead of, or in addition to, an inquiry or complaint at the local level.

DISSEMINATION OF COMPREHENSIVE POLICY

It is the policy of the Baxter Community School District not to discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, disability, religion, creed, age (for employment), marital status (for programs), sexual orientation, gender identity and socioeconomic status (for programs) in its educational programs and its employment practices. There is a grievance procedure for processing complaints of discrimination. If you have questions or a grievance related to this policy please contact the Secondary Principal or designee; 202 E. State Street, Baxter, Iowa 50028; 641.227.3102.

Students, parents of students, employees, and applicants for employment in the school district have the right to file a formal complaint alleging discrimination. The district has policies and procedures in place to identify and investigate complaints alleging discrimination. If appropriate, the district will take steps to prevent the recurrence of discrimination and to correct its discriminatory effects on the Complainant and others.

A Complainant may attempt to resolve the problem informally by discussing the matter with a building principal or a direct supervisor. However, the Complainant has the right to end the informal process at any time and pursue the formal grievance procedures outlined below. Use of the informal or formal grievance procedure is not a prerequisite to the pursuit of other remedies. Please note that informal processes and procedures are not to be used in certain circumstances (e.g., sexual harassment and sexual assault).

-Filing a Complaint-

A Complainant who wishes to avail himself/herself of this grievance procedure may do so by filing a complaint with the equity coordinator(s). An alternate will be designated in the event it is claimed that the equity coordinator or superintendent committed the alleged discrimination or some other conflict of interest exists. Complaints shall be filed within 180 days of the event giving rise to the complaint or from the date the Complainant could reasonably become aware of such occurrence. The Complainant will state the nature of the complaint and the remedy requested. The equity coordinator(s) shall assist the Complainant as needed.

-Investigation-

Within 15 days working days, the equity coordinator will begin the investigation of the complaint or appoint a qualified person to undertake the investigation (hereinafter "equity coordinator"). If the Complainant is under 18 years of age, the equity coordinator shall notify his or her parent(s)/guardian(s) that they may attend investigatory meetings in which the Complainant is involved. The complaint and identity of the Complainant, Respondent, or witnesses will only be disclosed as reasonably necessary in connection with the investigation or as required by law or policy. The investigation may include, but is not limited to the following:

A request for the Complainant to provide a written statement regarding the nature of the complaint;

A request for the individual named in the complaint to provide a written statement;

A request for witnesses identified during the course of the investigation to provide a written statement;

Interviews of the Complainant, Respondent, or witnesses;

An opportunity to present witnesses or other relevant information; and

Review and collection of documentation or information deemed relevant to the investigation.

Within 60 days working days, the equity coordinator shall complete the investigation and issue a report with respect to the findings.

The equity coordinator shall notify the Complainant and Respondent of the decision within 5 days working days of completing the written report. Notification shall be by U.S. mail, first class.

-Decision and Appeal-

The complaint is closed after the equity coordinator has issued the report, unless within 10 days working days after receiving the decision, either party appeals the decision to the superintendent by making a written request detailing why he/she believes the decision should be reconsidered.

GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE CONTINUED....

The equity coordinator shall promptly forward all materials relative to the complaint and appeal to the superintendent. Within 30 days working days, the superintendent shall affirm, reverse, amend the decision, or direct the equity coordinator to gather additional information. The superintendent shall notify the Complainant, Respondent, and the equity coordinator of the decision within 5 days working days of the decision. Notification shall be by U.S. mail, first class.

The decision of the superintendent shall be final.

The decision of the superintendent in no way prejudices a party from seeking redress through state or federal agencies as provided by in law.

This policy and procedures are to be used for complaints of discrimination, in lieu of any other general complaint policies or procedures that may be available.

If any of the stated time frames cannot be met by the district, the district will notify the parties and pursue completion as promptly as possible.

Retaliation against any person, because the person has filed a complaint or assisted or participated in an investigation, is prohibited. Persons found to have engaged in retaliation shall be subject to discipline by appropriate measures.

PARENT/GUARDIAN NOTICE SECTION 504 OF THE REHABILITATION ACT OF 1973

Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 prohibits discrimination against persons with a disability in any program receiving federal financial assistance. In order to fulfill obligations under Section 504, the Baxter Community School District has the responsibility to avoid discrimination in policies and practices regarding its personnel and students. No discrimination against any person with a disability should knowingly be permitted in any of the programs and practices of the school system.

The Baxter Community School District has the responsibilities under Section 504, which included the obligations to identify, evaluate, and, if the student is determined to be eligible under Section 504, to afford access to appropriate educational services.

If the parent/guardian disagrees with the determination made by the professional staff of the school district, he/she has a right to file a grievance and to a hearing with an impartial hearing officer.

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) also specifies rights related to educational records. This Act gives the parent or guardian the right to:

1) Inspect and review his/her child's educational records; 2) Make copies of these records; 3) Receive a list of the individuals having access to those records; 4) Ask for an explanation of any item in the records; 5) Ask for an amendment to any report on the grounds that it is inaccurate, misleading, or violates the child's rights; and 6) A hearing on the issue if the school refuses to make the amendment.
